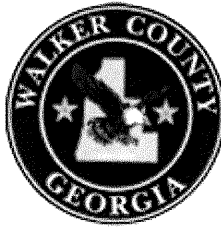

Minutes of the Regular Meeting

May 25, 2023

7:00 PM

I. Call to Order:

Chairman Shannon Whitfield called to order the Regular Scheduled Board of Commissioners Meeting held at Annex III, 201 S. Main Street, LaFayette, Georgia at 7:00 PM on May 25, 2023.

II. Attendees:

The following were present: Chairman Whitfield, Commissioner Robert Blakemore, Commissioner Mark Askew, Commissioner Brian Hart, Commissioner Robert Stultz, Legal and Policy Director David Gottlieb, Public Relations Director Joe Legge and Board Clerk Whitney Summey. Other guests signed in at the meeting as well. Please see the attached sign in sheet.

III. Approval of Agenda:

Commissioner Blakemore made a motion to approve the agenda, seconded by Commissioner Askew, 4 ayes and 0 nays, motion carried to approve the agenda.

IV. Approval of Minutes:

Commissioner Stultz made a motion to approve the minutes of the Regular Scheduled Meeting held May 11, 2023 at 7:00 p.m., seconded by Commissioner Hart, 4 ayes and 0 nays, motion was approved.

V. Public Hearing:

- I. Chairman Whitfield asked if anyone would like to speak on the request from Elite Air HVAC and maintenance for a rezone from R-3 to C-1 for property located at 524B Mission Ridge Road, Rossville, GA 30741, tax map and parcel number 0-140-009. Aaron Knight said he is one of the owners of the company. He brought a picture of the types of storage units they are wanting to build on the property. He shared the image on his phone with the Board and stated the buildings would be site built.
- II. Chairman Whitfield asked if anyone would like to speak on the request from Ada Jackson for a variance for less than five acres in a A-1 zone for property located at 5675 Chamberlain Road, LaFayette, GA 30728, tax map and parcel number 0-449-005. Brain Jackson said he wants to put a mobile home on his parents property to be able to help care for them since they are getting older. He said the land is zoned agriculture but is not usable for agricultural purposes. He said the property is very steep and hilly and the soil is not usable for growing anything. He said they did not know they needed a variance and had already put a deposit down on a mobile home. Commissioner Hart asked the size of the property and how many residences were there now. Mr. Jackson said they have 7.4 acres and his brother owns an additional acre behind it. He said there is one residence on the 7.4 acres.

VI. Public Comment:

- I. Jim Pope asked Commissioner Stultz to explain his opinion of the \$8,000.00 spent with the secondary council and how it benefited Walker County citizens. Commissioner Stultz gave details of the Gateway Project in Rossville and said it was good to have Ken Jarrard's opinion, as well as County Attorney David Gottlieb. He said the Board asked for a second opinion to keep the county from having another lawsuit like the situation with Erlanger. Mr. Pope asked if there were any attorneys in Walker County that would be suitable for a second opinion. Commissioner Stultz said the Jarrard Law Firm works with 13 other counties in Georgia and specializes in county government. He said there is no cost to the county unless they render services.

VII. Ceremonial:

- I. Deputy Chief Nathan Farrow gave details on a breech delivery on February 5th. He congratulated Lt. Dan Mims and firefighter Dylan Stansell and the patients on a successful delivery. He presented Lt. Mims and Stansell with a Life Saving Commendation Award and thanked them for their service. Chief Blake Hodge said dispatcher Holly Weber took the call and stayed on the line with the family. He said dispatch does not receive enough credit for the amazing work they do. He presented Holly Weber with a Life Saving Award and thanked her for service.

VIII. New Business:

- I. Chairman Whitfield read Resolution R-023-23 to award a contract for local maintenance asphalt resurfacing project 2023-01. He said all of the details of the bid are in the packet and Talley Construction proposed the lowest overall bid. Commissioner Blakemore made a motion to approve, seconded by Commissioner Askew, 4 ayes and 0 nays, motion carried.
- II. Chairman Whitfield asked if there was any discussion from the Board on the request from Elite Air HVAC and Maintenance for a rezone from R-3 to C-1 for property located at 524B Mission Ridge Road, Rossville, GA 30741, tax map and parcel number 0-140-009. Planning Director Jon Pursley said the Planning Commission did not see photos of the proposed buildings. He said they recommended approval with the condition of the storage buildings not being trailers or shipping containers. He said having site built units would not go against their conditions. Commissioner Blakemore made a motion to approve with the Planning Commissions conditions, seconded by Commissioner Stultz, 4 ayes and 0 nays, motion carried.
- III. Chairman Whitfield asked if there was any discussion from the Board on the request from Ada Jacketon for a variance for less than five acres in a A-1 zone for property located at 5675 Chamberlain Road, LaFayette, GA 30728, tax map and parcel number 0-449-005. Planning Director Jon Pursley said the Planning Commission recommended denial because of the structure already on the property. He said the property is not suitable for agricultural purposes and said the owners had mentioned putting in another driveway for the mobile home. Commissioner Hart said he is against the variance because this would allow for three homes on an A-1 property and will hurt the growth of agriculture property that is already in high demand in the area. Commissioner Askew said he agreed, but the property is improperly zoned and not suitable for agriculture use. Commissioner Blakemore said the property is only suitable to live on. Commissioner Blakemore made a motion to approve, seconded by Commissioner Askew, 3 ayes and 1 nays, motion carried to approve.
- IV. Chairman Whitfield said the Coats American Building was donated to the County around 2004 or 2005 and they are working on plans for additional environmental cleanup. Commissioner Stultz asked how much money has been spent since the County received the property. Chairman Whitfield said he is not sure on an exact number but it is into six figures since he has been in office and the prior administration did some cleanup as well. Commissioner Blakemore said the property still has a long way to go with cleanup. He said he would like to see the property in the hands of investors and back on the tax roll. Chairman Whitfield said they are waiting on a reply from the EPA for recommendations on the next steps for cleanup since the fire last year. Commissioner Askew said the County is blessed it has not had more incidents since the fires and he would like to see the property sold. He asked for more information and options to be brought back before the Board. Commissioner Hart said he would like to surplus the property and looks forward to working with the Mayor of Rossville to get this completed.
- V. Chairman Whitfield asked Landfill Manager Paine Gily to speak about purchase order 2023-00001337 for \$160,945.00 for a Caterpillar 308 mini hydraulic excavator for the Walker County Landfill. Paine Gily said this piece will allow the landfill to work on the slopes, ditched, and help improve stormwater flow. He reviewed the attachments and features of the piece and said they were able to see a demo of it. He said they are purchasing the extended warranty making the total warranty 60 months and 5,000 hours. Chairman Whitfield said Yancy is providing government pricing and there are SPLOST funds available for the purchase. Commissioner Hart said there is a lot of equipment that is not being used and no longer serves a purpose that he would like to see surplus. Mr. Gily said they are reviewing all of the equipment and making a list of what to send to auction. Commissioner Hart made a motion to approve, seconded by Commissioner Stultz, 4 ayes and 0 nays, motion carried.

IX. Commissioner Comments:

Commissioner Blakemore said there is a big grant for recreation coming to the north end and he appreciates everyone's hard work getting the grant. He said he is excited to see the funds put to use and the outcome for the citizens.

Commissioner Askew thanked everyone for coming out and being involved. He said Memorial Day weekend is the start of summer and said he hopes everyone has a great and safe summer.

Commissioner Hart thanked the firefighters for all of their great work. He gave information on the Honey Bee Festival coming up in LaFayette and encouraged everyone to come out.

Commissioner Stultz thanked all of the county employees and emergency services personnel for their hard work. He commended the building officials and said he has received great compliments on them recently. He asked Chairmen Whitfield for an update on the Hinkle Fire Station.

Chairman Whitfield said they received a 2.2 million dollar grant for the Rossville Recreation Center and a \$100,000.00 for an outdoor learning lab at Ridgeland High School. He said the final

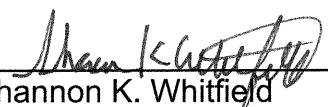
approval tonight for road paving will begin very soon. He said the fiber and broadband project with Windstream is moving forward and they hope to have everything finished by the end of 2024. He said the Hinkle fire station project is back on the SPLOST project list and they are working to get a complete redesign of the station. He said Annex II should be finished within the next month. He said primer is being applied to the west wall and an artist is set to begin a mural project next Tuesday as long as weather permits. Tire Amnesty Day had a great turnout and they hoped to have another event in October or November. He said Clarence Johnson with the Public Works department is doing great after his accident and he asked everyone to keep him in their prayers.

X. Executive Session:

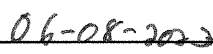

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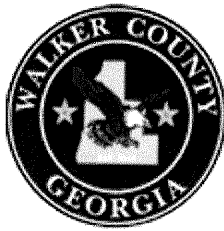

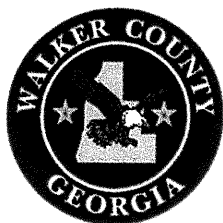

I. CALL TO ORDER:

Chairman Haney called the meeting to order at 6:25 P.M.

II. ROLL CALL

III. READING & APPROVAL OF THE APRIL 20, 2023 MEETING MINUTES:

Chairman Haney asked if there was a motion to approve or deny the minutes. John Morehouse made a motion to approve. Cindy Askew seconded the motion to approve. The vote was unanimous. Motion to approve minutes carried.

IV. MOTION TO OPEN THE PUBLIC HEARING:

Chairman Haney asked for a motion to open the public hearing. Todd Holt made a motion to open the public hearing. Zack Chapman seconded the motion. The vote was unanimous. Motion to open the public hearing carried.

V. PUBLIC HEARING:

Variance:

1. Ada Jackson: Chairman Haney asked if there was anyone present for the Jacksons. Brain Jackson came forward and stated that they would like a variance to put a mobile home on his parents land. He stated that they are getting older and harder for them to get around and he would like to be there to help take care of them. Todd Holt asked if someone was living in the house that is on the property and Mr. Jackson said yes his parents and Mr. Holt asked if anyone lived in the mobile home on the property and he said his brother lived in it. Michael Hicks asked Mr. Jackson how many acres was there and he stated 8.7. Todd Holt stated that the tax records show 7.4 and Mr. Jackson said his brother has a one acre tract at the back. Mr. Jackson said that his brothers mobile home is not on his one acre tract. Michael Hicks asked if the house up front was his parents and he said yes and then Michael asked what was at the very top and Mr. Jackson said it was just a garage. Kristy Parker explained that the one acre tract that his brother owns was there before zoning. Jon Pursley asked if they were all going to share the same drive and Kristy Parker asked Mr. Jackson that didn't he say they were going to have their own drive coming off at a different location and he said yes it would be. Michael Hicks said the property looked pretty steep and asked if they had cattle or anything and Mr. Jackson said no they do not use it for agricultural purposes. There were no other questions.

2. NGA Harrier Developers Inc.: Chairman Haney asked if there was anyone present for this item. Colin Johnson came forward and stated that this preliminary plat was just a continuation of the Hawks Ridge Subdivision. He said this would be phase three. Zack Champman asked about the lot size and Mr. Johnson stated that lot widths would all be 51'. Cindy Askew asked Mr. Johnson about the screen buffer running through some of the lots. Mr. Johnson stated that there would be zero grading in that area and that the building pad would not be in it. Mr. Johnson stated that the setbacks showed on the plans. Cindy Askew asked if they had the land disturbance permit for this and he said yes with the state but not yet with the county. Cindy then asked about the detention area and Mr. Johnson said that the detention area is on another phase and that they have it so this part is draining down into those ponds. There was some discussion on the green space area. There were no other comments.

3. Maurick Development Group Inc.: Chairman Haney asked if there was anyone here on behalf of this. Brandon ? came forward and stated that the owner was RP Homes. He stated that this was an approved PUD. He said that there were some changes made that is not on these plans. He stated that they had to move road C to the east for safety issues because of a curve. Zack Chapman asked if that changed the number of lots and Brandon said yes that the original site plan showed a total of 166 lots and this plat shows 178. He said that as they move forward that they may have to remove some lots because they have already had to cut it down to 174. It was brought up that the Board of Commissioners did approve this to be zoned PUD. He said that page one of this plat would be their phase three, page two would be phase two and page three would be phase one. There was discussion on the lot sizes and how the middle part would be townhomes. Michael Hicks asked on phase two in the middle on the townhomes they would have a rear alley for access to the townhomes and Brandon said yes. Michael then asked if that would make them closer to the road and that each unit would be the width of that unit and Brandon said yes. Michael then asked what would be the buffer between each townhome and Brandon said 25' and they would be four units each. Michael asked if they were there for preliminary on phase one and Brandon said no they were asking for approval for the whole development. They would like to move forward with the land disturbance permit. Zack Chapman asked about the greenspace and buffer. Michael Hicks said

there greenspace was more to the front. Zack said he feels like a flood area is not really a usable area. Micahel Hicks said that may be what they need to look at the next time with PUD requests. Colin Johnson then described the greenspace area in more detail. Cindy Askew asked them about the initial site plan. Colin Johnson said it was presented at the rezone and did show the proposed lots and greenspace area. Zack Chapman asked them about the topography and that the plans did not show the grading that will be done. Mr. Brian Morton came forward and wanted to know if the county was prepared for the traffic this will bring. Carlen Bowers tried to explain some of the traffic issues and how they are trying to help. He was wanting to know what they were planning on doing with the traffic that will be trying to avoid any round-a-bouts coming through Overbrook Drive. Michael Hicks asked if an option could be for a sign be put up that said right turn only. Carlen said it is possible. Chairman Haney let Mr. Morton know that it would be noted that he was against this. No further questions.

4. Elite Air HVAC & Maintenance: Chairman Haney asked if there was anyone present for this request. Aaron Kight came forward and said they would like to rezone the property to have storage for boats and RV's and things of that nature. Todd Holt asked if you got to this property off of Bailey Lane and Mr. Knight said yes even though it has a Mission Ridge address. Mr. Holt asked if their bussiness was at this location and Mr. Knight said that they use the building to store some of their stuff in. Kristy Parker expalined that the building has always been used as commercial and that there is a commercial business in front and to the south of this that is not zoned commerical. It was asked if they were going to have storage units and he said that they did not plan on having any. Micahel Hicks asked if Bailey Lane was a private drive and he was told no it is a county road. Michel Hicks asked if this would be covered stoarge and Mr. Knight said right now ony open storage but they would be open to either. It was discussed that parking and vehicles can be on the property lines that only structures would have to meet the setbacks. There wer no other comments.

VI. MOTION TO CLOSE THE PUBLIC HEARING:

Chairman Haney asked if there was a motion to close the public hearing. Todd Holt made a motion to close the public hearing. Rob Walthour seconded the motion. Vote was unanimous. Motion to close the public hearing carried.

VII: MOTION TO OPEN NEW BUSINESS:

Chairman Haney asked if there was a motion to go into new business. Todd Holt made a motion to open the new business. John Morehouse seconded the motion. Vote was unanimous. Motion to open new business carried.

VIII: NEW BUSINESS:

1. Ada Jackson: Chairman Haney asked if there was a motion to approve or deny the variance request. Michael Hicks made a motion to approve. There was no second. Motion failed. Chairman Haney then asked if the was a

motion to deny. Cindy Askew made a motion to deny due to it being zoned agricultural. John Morehouse seconded the motion to deny. Vote in favor to deny was five (John Morehouse, Todd Holt, Cindy Askew, Rob Walthour & Zack Champman). One vote not in favor of denying was Michael Hicks. Vote was five to one in favor of denying the request. Motion to deny carried.

2. NGA Harrier Development: Chairman Haney asked if there was a motion to approve or deny the request. Michael Hicks made a motion to approve. Todd Holt seconded the motion to approve. The vote was unanimous. Motion to approve carried.

3. Maurick Development Group: Chairman Haney asked if there was a motion to approve or deny the request. Michael Hicks made a motion to approve the preliminary plat with 165 lots. Zack Chapman seconded the motion. The vote was unanimous. The representative said there were 166 lots on the original site plan. Michael Hicks made a motion to amend his motion on approving the plat for 165 lots to a new motion to approve with 166 lots. Zack Chapman seconded the motion. The vote was unanimous. Vote to approve the plat with 166 lots carried.

4. Elite Air HVAC Maintenance: Chairman Haney asked if there was a motion to approve or deny this request. John Morehouse made a motion to approve the rezone with conditions that there be no temporary buildings or storage containers. Zack Chapman seconded the motion with conditions. The vote was unanimous. Vote to approve with conditions carried.

**A RESOLUTION OF THE WALKER COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS TO
AWARD A CONTRACT FOR LOCAL MAINTENANCE ASPHALT RESURFACING
PROJECT 2023-01**

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of Walker County ("Board") is the governing authority of Walker County, Georgia; and

WHEREAS, Section 11, item 7 of the Enabling Act grants the Board the authority to repair public roads and bridges; and

WHEREAS, on April 13, 2023, the Board approved a list of roads to be resurfaced or paved in Resolution R-18-23 and let those roads for bid under Walker County Local Maintenance Asphalt Resurfacing Project 2023-01; and

WHEREAS, the project was posted on the Georgia Procurement Registry and advertised in the Walker County Messenger on April 26, 2023 and May 3, 2023, as required by Section 12 of the county's Enabling Act; and

WHEREAS, O.C.G.A 32-4-68 provides that where a contract has been let for bid, the county, by resolution entered in its minutes, shall award the contract to the lowest reliable bidder, provided that the county shall have the right to reject any and all such bids; and

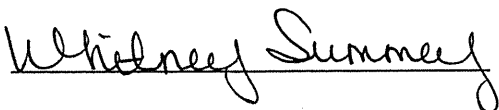
WHEREAS, among the bidders who fully complied with the requirements for bidding, Talley Construction presented the lowest unit price bid;

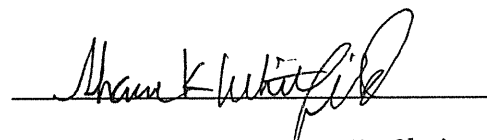

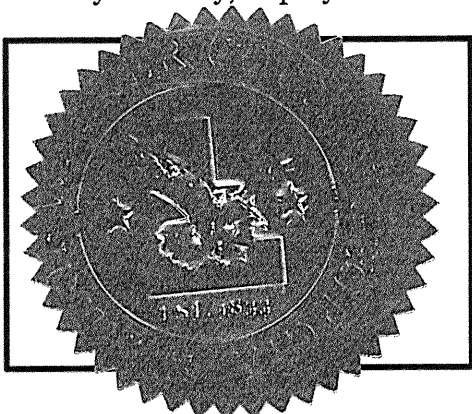

UGA H.E.R.D program

UGA is home to some of the greatest sports and athletes in the entire country. With our back-to-back football championships, we are currently setting the stage for what I hope is a dynasty. Although we are well known in the sports world, our school's research has improved and impacted millions of lives around the world. One aspect of the research we do here is focused on improving agriculture and livestock

production. Locally, livestock production is a big business for Catoosa and surrounding counties. That's why I thought today would be a good day to talk about the UGA H.E.R.D program.

The Heifer Evaluation and Reproductive Development (H.E.R.D) program was created as a way to educate the beef industry in Georgia on health and nutrition practices that result in better quality animals. This is measured by the ability of

those animals to reach a target weight, display certain reproductive traits and dispositions. It also acts as the link between the cattle farmers, UGA and the many participating county agents. UGA has provided two facilities, one in Tifton and one in Calhoun, for producers to consign their cattle for research and sale.

The heifer's rations consist of hay, plus a supplement designed for optimum growth and development. Heifers will be fed to gain 1.5 to 1.75 pounds per day. The hay is procured through a bidding system prior to the start of each year's program based on specific nutritional guidelines. Addition-

ally, the supplement will be developed based on the current year's feed prices to provide the least-cost ration for the targeted gain. Additionally, the amount fed may be adjusted based on visual appraisal and performance data of the heifers. Heifer are also bred utilizing a timed artificial insemination (A.I.) protocol. They will be heat-synchronized and bred A.I. (once at each location) followed by at least 45 days with a clean-up (natural service) bull. Consignors wanting to specify a different A.I. sire may do so but must furnish the semen at the time of delivery. The animals will be auctioned off and their

final values recorded to track the success of the program.

Today we have just scratched the surface on this UGA beef program and if you are interested in learning more feel free to reach out to me. The results from this program are released each year and can be found in our Extension Office or online. Be safe out there.

"I became hungry to learn everything I could about how it worked and how I could turn this neglected, beat-up truck into everything I envisioned it to be," she said, adding that at that time she had not considered college because she could not afford it. She had no future plans after high school.

"One day the Dual Enrollment coordinator came into my class and talked to me about this incredible opportunity to take classes at GNTC with little-to-no cost for me," Pemberton said.

"With my future in mind, I knew this was an opportunity that I couldn't pass up, so the next day I marched right into my high school counselor's office and got the list of requirements to begin the process, and I began my path to success," she said, characterizing GNTC as a "blessing" to her.

She said she has learned not only automotive skills, but also soft skills, such as patience, persistence and motivation to continue working towards her goals every day, she explained.

"The beauty of the Technical College System of Georgia is it's accessible, allowing even those who may have given up on the idea of going to college to not feel held back from the opportunities awaiting," she said. "It is a flexible and more affordable alternative to a four-year college for students like me who have a desire for learning and want to get prepared to join the workforce."

When she graduates in May, she will have her high school diploma, as well as multiple college technical certificates, she said.

The Rick Perkins Award honors the TCSG's most outstanding instructors. The award has been an ongoing statewide event since 1991 and recognizes technical college instructors who make significant contributions to technical education through innovation and leadership in their fields.

The 2023 Rick Perkins Award winner will serve as ambassador for the Technical College System of Georgia (TCSG) and will make many public appearances throughout the year, including addressing both chambers of the Georgia General Assembly.

A panel of leaders from business, industry and government will choose one instructor to be the 2023 TCSG's Rick Perkins Instructor of the Year. The winner will receive a \$2,500 cash prize.

Gonzalez, a Dalton resident, established the Diesel Equipment Technology program on GNTC's Whitfield Murray Campus, designed its curriculum and secured support from several area transportation-related businesses, including Freightliner Trucks, U.S. Xpress Enterprises Inc., Penske Automotive, Shaw Industries Group

Inc. and Ford of Dalton. This support has included money, tools and diesel equipment, which students take apart and rebuild in the classroom.

The Leadership Dalton-Whitfield 2022 class donated \$2,460 to outfit 12 GNTC Diesel program students with mechanic tool kits they need to jumpstart their careers after Gonzalez suggested the donation as a way the Leadership class could support GNTC and its students.

Gonzalez, the son of two immigrants who both have only a sixth-grade education, recalled that his life changed on the last day of eighth grade. "You are a good kid, Sal, and you have a lot of potential," his teacher said. "Those words and that hug changed me. I started working hard in school and became a good student."

As a high school sophomore, he "fell in love with working on cars" after he started working with his uncle in an auto repair shop. His uncle and his high school automotive class teacher told him they learned to work on cars at a technical college.

He got a job changing oil and performing basic maintenance at a car dealership after high school, but he could not advance in the shop because he lacked the necessary training, he said.

He was discouraged that he did not qualify for financial aid to attend technical college; however, his father convinced him to pursue his education and worked odd jobs to help him attend technical college, he explained.

He earned a diploma in Auto-Diesel Technology with High Performance Engines from Lincoln Tech in 2010.

"All of this was possible through hard work and a technical education," he said. "I am the son of two dreamers who gave me the resources needed to be successful in life. I hope my students and my children see me as an example to go after their dreams and to never give up."

Prior to starting at GNTC in 2018, Gonzalez was technician/team leader at Brookler Ford Lincoln Mercury (now known as Ford of Dalton) from 2018 and apprentice technician at Brookler Automotive in Conyers from 2016.

His community service activities include mentoring students while he was in college, serving warm meals during Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays at Providence Ministries, Spanish/English translating during the Christmas toy giveaway at Providence Ministries, volunteering as a softball and T-ball coach and donating to GNTC's Foundation, which supports areas of institutional need including student scholarships, equipment purchases, library materials purchases and staff development.

The most recent state winners to represent GNTC were 2019 Rick Perkins Award winner Leyner Agueta, program director of Business Management, and Troy Peco, assistant dean of Industrial Technologies, program director and instructor of Automotive Technology and the state's 2018 Rick Perkins Award winner.

kids from around the world. "Last year," Cherry says, "the team from Columbia came to our team to practice. They spoke Spanish, we spoke English, but everyone spoke robotics."

Working as a team, says Cherry, involves figuring out each person's strengths and capitalizing on them. Judges at competitions often have questions. Cherry says the student with the best communications skills will answer

the questions. Some kids, he says, are better at coding or math or design. "They learn from each other and they hone their strengths."

Jeff Sikes, principal of CES, couldn't be prouder. "This is one of the best things I've been involved in. It builds resolve and thinking and problem-solving in kids and brings their skills and potential before top universities and tech companies in the world."

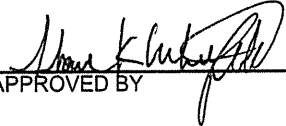

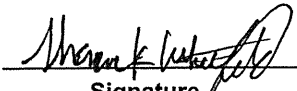

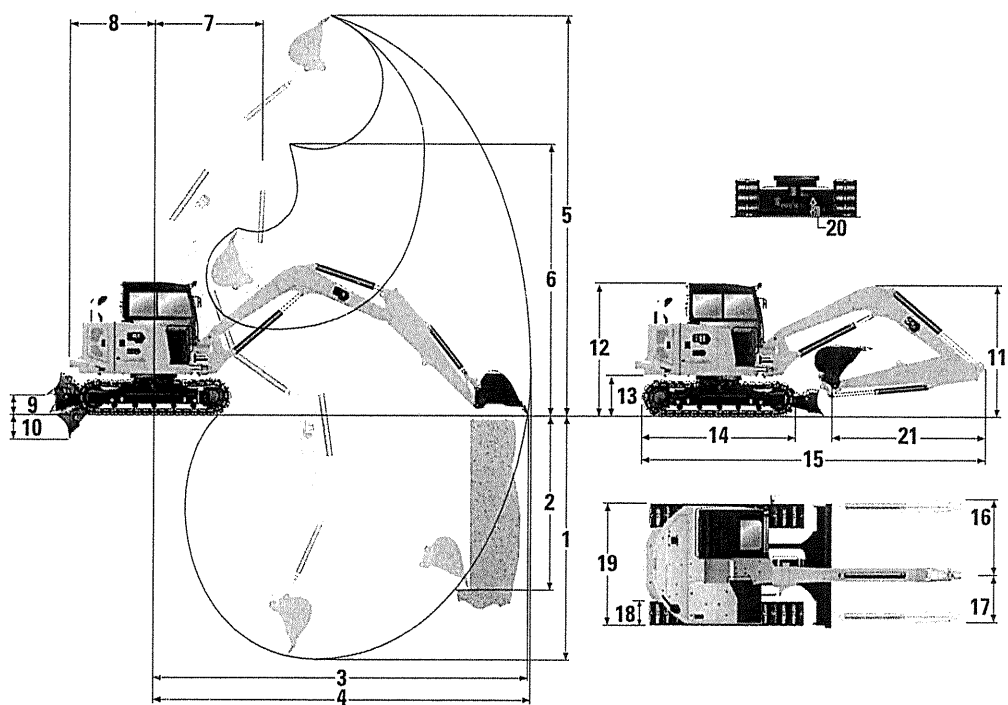
